





Imagine a place where your parents or grandparents can gracefully age without ever needing to relocate from the community they call home—surrounded by familiar faces, enduring connections, and the peaceful nature of the Florida Panhandle and Gulf Coast. This vision will come to life in a development project that transforms 22 acres of low-density residential land in Apalachicola, Florida, into a thoughtfully designed senior living community. Blending independent living homes, assisted living townhomes, and a memory care facility, this cohesive, accessible environment evolves to meet the changing needs of its aging residents, ensuring they can remain in a supportive and familiar setting.

Rooted in the architectural vernacular of coastal Florida styles, the project will need to address key safety challenges to ensure the safety of its residents, including the site's location in a secondary flood zone just 15 feet above sea level. This holistic approach creates a vibrant, supportive environment where seniors can thrive, forge meaningful connections, and receive various evolving levels of care they may need—all without the disruption of moving away from their community.

Users range in physical and cognitive ailments, from mobility issues to progressive conditions like dementia, requiring adaptable living and community spaces that enhance safety and accessibility. Needs supportive environments that offer personalized care options, levels of independence, and social interaction.

Concept

Cypress Haven, Apalachicola's newest senior living community, draws inspiration from the majestic bald cypress trees that grace the site and nearby national forest. Known for their resilience and connection to water, bald cypress trees symbolize the strength, unity, and enduring support that define this senior living environment.

Just as the bald cypress can be propagated to ensure its resilience and continuity, Cypress Haven is thoughtfully designed to nurture strong roots and lasting connections—a supportive environment where residents can 'plant their roots' and age gracefully within a community they trust. The natural elements of a cypress inspire the community's core values of resilience, adaptability, and interconnectedness. Architecture and landscaping honor the site's coastal character and integrate sustainable practices that reflect and honor the bald cypress's adaptability and history. Cypress Haven is more than a place to live; it is a place to thrive, where roots run deep, connections grow strong, and the natural rhythms of life are accommodated and embraced.









The entryway and lounge provide bright, welcoming areas for residents and guests to gather and relax, and seek help from staff. Garden rooms provide natural light to spill into the lounge, entryway, and corridors while giving residents accessible views of nature, even during inclement weather.

A bright, light entryway creates a welcoming environment for residents and visitors. A **side entryway for assisted living residents** allows for easy access to the lounge and dining halls. **Staff facilities are clustered in the middle of the memory care facility**. A central courtyard creates a connection to the outdoors while still being fully enclosed for resident protection.



Cafe & Bar

The assisted living and visitor public spaces are connected to the memory care facility through the cafe and bar, designed for interaction between all residents while retaining a sense of separation between the different needs of residents. Screens display information for the day, including events, meal information, and weather, where residents are served buffet-style or tableside..

Materials were selected to give a more European feel, breaking from the coastal-transitional style of the other amenities spaces. The distinctive change of materials provides another level of wayfinding and sense of place.





Dining Rooms

Separate dining rooms for memory care residents and assisted living residents allow for staggered seating times to accommodate the number of residents served by Cypress Grove. Views to the courtyard and indoor amenities encourage interaction past meal times.

The dining chairs have arms, and the tables have pedestal bases to aid residents in sitting comfortably for meals. Chair upholstery is silicone-based and bleach cleanable. Acoustic ceiling beams and planks provide a more comfortable environment.



Linear lights & concealed ——ceiling panels lead residents and visitors through corridors.

Nooks and drop ceilings are – painted in a contrasting color to call to resident doorways.

Chair moldings have a built-in handrail to help seniors keep their balance

Lower portion of the wall features a grasscloth-look wall protectant to protect against scuffs, especially common from walkers and wheelchairs.





Inset memory boxes display personal mementos to help residents with memory impairments locate their apartments.

Linear carpet tile patterns are – turned and interrupted to call attention to resident doorways.



The sleeping hall promotes independence and safety in memory care residents through adaptability, wayfinding, and universal design principles. Ceiling grid lines, linear lights, and drop ceilings subtly direct residents and visitors through the hallway to resident rooms and lounge spaces.



Translucent blue acrylic ADA room signs with inset raised lettering & braille evoke the idea of the nearby Gulf coast waters.



Memory care apartments are fitted with furniture friendly to residents with dementia; windowed doors and drawers allow residents to see their items at all times.

Two types of memory care apartments provide residents with options with various features for a variety of needs, including an optional kitchenette, exterior access, and extra closet space.

Assisted Living Townhomes


Four rows of townhomes form two neighborhoods that provide support and community while honoring residents' autonomy. Exterior patios and central courtyards provide opportunities for social connections amongst other Cypress Grove residents. The disconnected dining area serves as a way to encourage residents to gather in the community center, but residents are able to get meals delivered to their homes if they choose to do so.






Personal choice is given to assisted living residents while being respectful of boundaries by incorporating a variety of housing options at different price points and sizes.


















Independent Living Homes



Independence and safety are promoted through wide hallways, adaptability, accessible design, and universal design.

The primary suite is located on the first floor, and two bedrooms and an additional bathroom are located on the second floor, accessible through a staircase and residential elevator.

The Bayfront: Living Space

The largest and most opulent floor plan to select is the Bayfront home. It features a one and a half story living room with a loft overlooking, a full-sized dining space and kitchen with eat-in bar. Optional built-ins flank the fireplace and an inset rug eliminates a potential tripping hazard without sacrificing design. A residential elevator and a hallway to the primary suite, located to the left of the living room, provide accessibility.



LUKS BYTHE SEA



Based in Antalya, Turkey, this 8-story hotel features a myriad of amenities, thoughtful guest rooms and suites, and a floor of condominiums.

The concept of Lüks is **Antalya's cliffside**. Rough, jagged forms and neutral tones are derived from cliffside rock formations, a unique attraction of Antalya. The terracotta colors of cliffside villages contrast the lush green landscape. Harmony is delicately balanced between antiquity and the natural environment. The waterfalls cutting into the cliffside inspire rhythm, harmony, and curvilinear forms. The water throughout the cliffside creates places of gathering.

Averages of 6 inches of rain during the winter, 1 inches of rain during the summer.



Welcome & Lobby Space

As a guest walks into Lüks, a 30-foot tall cliffside feature fills the lobby with sounds of rushing water and scents of citrus and greenery fill the multi-story volume with a sense of peace and tranquility. Views into the multi-level bar are to the right of the entrance, inviting guests in.

Self-illuminating and backlit hotel signage paired with a painted mural of the Mediterranean Sea draws guests to the check-in counter in an otherwise neutral space.







1st Story Bar

The lowest bar, on ground level, features earthy materials and a neutral color palette inspired by Antalya's cliffside.







Mezzanine & 2nd Story Bar

A first-floor mezzanine overlooks the lobby and wine cellar, featuring rich wood tones and materiality. It also overlooks the Old City and the Mediterranean. The second-floor bar features moody tones that cover the walls, floor, and ceiling. Sophisticated patterns and textures create an eclectic, curated feel.

Deniz Üstü Steakhouse

Stop by the on-site restaurant for an expertly paired steak and wine dinner. The intimate ceilings mimic the topography of Antalya's cliffside, hand-carved woodwork, brass tiling, and rich textiles add to the space's decadence.








Guest Suites & Sleeping Accommodations

Up to eight guests can vacation together in a two-bedroom suite without sacrificing luxurious accommodations. The suite includes a full kitchen and two full bathrooms, providing flexibility to guests traveling in larger groups. The primary suite features a large wet area with a rainfall shower and soaking tub as well as a private balcony.





Sleeping Floor Lobby

A two-story volume gives guests a sense of grandeur while calling to the concept of Antalya's cliffside. Water fountains on alternating floors provide soothing ambient noise to muffle undesired noise.

Antalya, Turkey is the second-most desirable city for the purchase of second homes. Floors 8 & 8M house condominiums available to high-end clientele for purchase. Exquisite cabinetry and woodwork frame picture perfect views of the Mediterranean. Lighting from skylights above flood the living spaces with warm natural light.


Rooftop Pool & Spa

Hot tubs and a sun shelf cascade into the central pool, similar to how rivers and waterfalls flowing from Antalya's cliffside meet in the sea. A restorative cedar-planked sauna and garden beds call to the lush cliffside greenery.












The rustle of lush foliage, the pitter-patter of animals treading about, the soothing sounds of water and wind all create an enriching environment for its inhabitants. To do just the same, Terra Mater Pediatrics in downtown Baltimore takes a page out of nature's book and functions as a smoothly **interconnected ecosystem**. Ecosystems are complex, balanced communities of organisms in an environment working towards a common goal, similar to how staff, caregivers, and patients work together to achieve great results.

Terra Mater Pediatrics serves patients from 0 to 18 and treats physical and behavioral health conditions. The design creates a sense of community by weaving the local Baltimorean vernacular and environment with the concept of interconnected ecosystems to involve families and staff in a holistic approach to pediatric health. The clinic features eight exam rooms and staff accommodations for around ten employees at any given time. Biophilic design principles are integrated throughout each area of the pediatric clinic, and exposure to fresh air and exercise is encouraged by the seamless integration of the outdoor playscape. Staff and patients' privacy and wellness needs are fulfilled through the clinic's strategic space planning, acoustical considerations, and vibrant color schemes.

Crafting a positive user experience and creating holistic wellness is emphasized throughout the clinic by ensuring a stimulating and efficient "habitat" for the broad age range of users. Incorporating **positive distractions, strategic organization, and emotionally influential color palettes** are some strategies the design and concept employ to help regulate strong emotions in the pediatric clinic.




The concept of interconnected ecosystems is represented through the whimsical design of three environments harmoniously linking each element of the clinic. Environmental graphics are applied as Aspex wall protectant to protect the wall finish while adding wayfinding elements and positive distractions throughout public-facing spaces.




blue ocean, a lush jungle, and the warm desert. The delineation of these unique "neighborhoods" based on these three environments provides a sense of whimsy, community, and wayfinding.

Zoning & Atmosphere

Areas of the clinic are delineated by desired feelings, tasks, and privacy requirements. Two entrances to the clinic as well as an internal lobby to travel to other floors were considered through the circulation paths within the space.











- A central nurses' station and vitals area provides easy access to exam rooms and staff areas.
- Welded rubber flooring colors brings contrast and emphasis to the waiting area and doorways of each exam room in order to guide patients and caregivers.
- The entryway is kept neutral and clear in order to accommodate the stairwell and elevator lobby which services the different floors of the building.

- An accent faux tree was built into the structural building column within the exam hallway. The tree serves as wayfinding and provides positive acoustic qualities within open spaces.
- A flexible-use patient education center is used to teach and reinforce healthy habits and provide an enriching, playful environment when not used for private discussions.
- 6 Adjoining bathrooms allow for centralized plumbing walls and easier maintenance access. The bathrooms adhere to ADA and the patient bathroom includes a baby changing table.
- The design of the staff kitchen accommodates the building's columns while delineating the space and providing barstool seating.

Port Playground

The outdoor space uses elements inspired by Baltimore's piers like driftwood, cargo net fencing, and blue flooring continued from the interior in order to connect users to the local environment while providing an outlet for lively patients.

Oceanscape Entryway

The lobby of Terra Mater Pediatrics implements whimsical abstractions of the colors and shapes of the ocean in order to calm anxious patients. Positive distractions like a large fish tank, interactive sand table, and circular nook seating achieve this goal.






Door numbers matching the design of the clinic's branding are mounted at child-height to involve children within the clinic's wayfinding.






The Workshop is located in Cascades Park, Tallahassee, FL. The studio provides a creative escape for local residents, students of nearby universities, and visiting families. Cascades serves as a gathering space for visitors and residents of Tallahassee, with local parking and ample walking paths. Nearby amenities include a visitors center, memorials and museums, two eatin restaurants, and a hotel. The mission of The Workshop is to increase accessibility to the arts through removing high cost barriers to provide access to otherwise expensive and large art supplies and equipment that may not be available to young adults living in Tallahassee. The Workshop's location and welcoming environment provides a comfortable space for new and experienced artists alike to create works of art.

The built environment achieves the mission and goals of The Workshop by providing **clear, open sight lines** to make guests feel comfortable within the space. **Bright architectural finishes and furnishings create an energizing, creative space for artists.** Access to pottery equipment and art supplies are emphasized through bold colors and protruding forms into The Workshop.






The Workshop's design is informed by the concept of a **prism**, which references both the literal connection to colorful light, as well as a metaphorical connection of transforming something blank into a vivid array. Prisms take in natural white light and transform it into beautiful geometric refractions of **bright color**; in essence, The Workshop does the same, providing quests the opportunity to take a blank piece of clay or pottery and transforming it into something remarkable. The concept is demonstrated by **bright** color blocking and considering how light interacts with the space. Large sculptural environmental graphics and elements immerse quests in the bold artistic experience.




Different activity zones determine the circulation and floor plan layout. A retail storefront is located near the windows to draw guests in.

Pottery studio space is located in the middle of the suite, allowing guests some privacy while creating art.

The kiln room and back of house is only accessible to staff and are located out of the way of public travel.




Track lighting is utilized as the primary ambient light source as it can be mounted on and between the structural beams and pointed where light is needed to evenly illuminate the space.



Checkout, Pottery Painting, & Kiln Room

Upon first entering the Workshop, guests are greeted with a color blocked checkout counter, built-in seating niches to paint pottery, and views to bold environmental graphics in the kiln room. A central sink and shelving unit provides access to the painting center.



Storefront displays are constructed from tempered glass, covered with translucent vinyl. As the evening light shines into the front windows, colored 'fragments' of light illuminate the neutral floors.

The pottery building area features wheels, tables, and cabinetry for quests to utilize while creating art. Regulars can store their art in lockers or on open shelving when not in use.


Branded art supplies provide a useful, practical offering for guests who may not like to buy branded clothing while keeping with the theme of The Workshop.





The visual space of the office will grow as staff and clients navigate the office, creating a sense of movement, emulating how trailblazers amplify ideas from a source to their destination. Burrell Communication's new regional office in Nashville is a modern, collaborative, and inclusive space that amplifies the company's brand, culture, and employee experience.

The shaded regions of the blocking diagram represent the designated square footages for each required space. The darkest regions require the most privacy, the medium-toned regions need semi-private spaces, and the lightest spaces being public-facing.



Each floor plan shows the finish materials of furniture and flooring. A cane detection feature is built-in beneath the monumental staircase. A receptionist at a custom reception desk greets visitors as they enter the lobby.









Lobby & Reception

Burrell Communication's regional office centers around a voluminous twostory lobby. As Burrell regularly works with some of the world's most prestigious and largest brands, an impressive lobby space sets clients' expectations before meeting with office staff.



Café

Serving as the staff's social 'hub' for gatherings and company-wide events, the café includes multiple seating options, including barstool seating, lounge chair seating, and table and chair seating. If more seating is needed in the space, the adjacent training room features a modular wall capable of nearly doubling the square footage of the café.

Many of the spaces within the regional office feature gypsum board tray ceilings. Since the café is a premium space within the office, the standard tray ceiling was replaced with a grid-type multi-tier formation pendant light installation. The lights are connected to a dimmer switch to provide a comfortable, even light distribution throughout the space.

Coffee Bar

The elevation depicts a lounge seating area, stainless steel appliances to cater to the needs of staff members, and copper paneling on the back of the island to provide a durable surface while introducing a pop of color to the space.

Workstation Neighborhoods

Each neighborhood, or grouping of workstations, allows the staff of each department to collaborate as needed. These neighborhoods are visually separated through the clusters of workstations and the placement of acoustic baffle ceilings.

Acoustical privacy is provided for through baffled drop ceilings, carpet tiles, and upholstered workstation dividers. Multiple layers of lighting are provided to ensure the comfort of staff. Two forms of usercontrolled individual lights are supplied to each workstation, and overhead lighting allows for a baseline standard footcandle level throughout the office.




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
Aging in Place Residential Design


123 Park Overlook, Atlanta, GA

This project involved the interior design of a home for Mr. and Mrs. Williams, a couple in their mid-60s who live in Atlanta, GA. The home encompasses the principles of aging in place and accessible design while feeling homey and welcoming to multiple generations of visitors. Providing a mix of multipurpose spaces will allow the home to grow with Mr. and Mrs. Williams as they age. The concept of Atlanta's urbanism and city planning guided the design of the Williamses' residence. Similar to downtown Atlanta, the main living space is open to receive guests and host gatherings. Each of the bedrooms has a distinct purpose and mood, similar to different suburbs of Atlanta.



Due to the constrained size of the home and expansive list of the client's wishes. it was essential to determine adjacencies and space plan the home's footprint. By using an adjacency matrix, bubble diagram, and blocking diagram. efficiencies in the home's lavout were discovered and utilized to create a home that was easy and safe to navigate while providing ample space for aging in place and universal



Since the kitchen and primary bathroom are the most vital spaces in the home for the Williamses, it was critical that both areas could still be functional if one of the homeowners had future mobility issues. The kitchen features an accessible portion of a kitchen island, pocket doors into the butler's pantry to avoid clearance issues, and high-end appliances designed to be accessible with little effort.

The primary bathroom features a curbless wet area, a wheelchair-accessible vanity, and a large storage cabinet. Special attention was paid to the shower area, with body sprayers, a rainfall shower, and a handheld faucet to allow for many uses while providing a high-end experience.



Living Room

A mix of neutrals and pops of color provides the Williamses with their desired 'suburban chic' style. There are ample paths around all furniture in the space to increase accessibility, and c-channel side tables can be moved to suit the needs of the room's users. Using an upholstered bench instead of a traditional coffee table will help prevent injuries to the Williamses if they bump into or fall against the table. Fieldstone local to Atlanta was used as the fireplace veneer.

Primary Bathroom

A private window in the wet area allows for natural light in the space. An under-mount bathtub with a quartz surround and matching quartz bench provides a high-end experience in the bathroom. While the bathroom uses light materials to maintain an airy and open feel, bronze bathroom fixtures, a teal cabinet, and a cobalt blue tile accent wall provide visual contrast to make it easy for the Williamses to navigate the space as they age. Accessible grab bars and slip-resistant flooring help them stay safe in the room.





The final floor plan of the home shows a broad overview of room adjacencies and broad material selection. Although materials vary by space, unity is achieved through the flooring choices and custom cabinetry.

Primary Bedroom

The bedroom features sheer and room darkening drapery, allowing the Williamses to control the amount of light entering their bedroom. A four-poster bed provides an opportunity to regain balance in the space. An inset rug allows for a sense of softness while preventing tripping.

The materials board provides a glimpse of the materials sourced for the main living space of the Williamses' residence.






Kitchen & Living Room Perspective


A running water feature and gas lamps provide visual and auditory biophilic elements to the **outdoor living space**.
